Non-Teaching Staff Training on E-Governance Held in Pokhara

On the fifteenth day, the closing session was chaired by the coordinator of the organizing committee Dr. Min Pun and attended by Campus Chief Prof. Dr. Chandra Bahadur Thapa as Chief Guest. The session was also attended by the Chief of Audit Division of Tribhuvan University Narayan Basnet who gave a short talk on the provision of auditing within the Tribhuvan University offices.



The chief guest distributed the certificates of participation to the trainees. The certificate distribution was followed by feedback sharing and speech delivered by the distinguished guests, expert representatives and trainee representatives.

According to the sources, with over 60 years of its history, Prithvi Narayan Campus is one of the oldest and largest campuses of Tribhuvan University and is striving for finding solutions to

challenges and preparing students for leadership in the 21st century. The campus was founded on 1 September 1960 in the western region. The campus now has 4 faculties and 1 institute: Faculty of Humanities & Social Sciences, Faculty of Management and Faculty of Law, Faculty of Education, and Institute of Science & Technology. It has 34 departments and runs 32 programs and offers about 500 courses. There are 521 faculty and 100 non-teaching staff who have involved in providing higher education to 10511 students in various academic programs.

It is learnt that in 2018, the campus was awarded the "Best Campus of the Year" by the Ministry of Education, Nepal. Similarly, in 2019, the campus was accredited by the University Grants Commission (UGC), Nepal as one of the QAA certified higher education institutions in the country.



As part of its efforts to maintain quality

education in the institution, according to the Coordinator of the training, the campus has conducted different academic activities such as faculty development programs, non-teaching staff training, student support programs, infrastructure development programs, international exchange programs and extension programs. For instance, the "Non-Teaching Staff Training on



E-Governance" for its non-teaching staff is to enhance their work efficiency.

The non-teaching staff training was facilitated by a team of 29 experts from different academic and professional backgrounds.

Mostly, the focus of the training was on the use of computer and information technology in the office. Since the training was also focused on good governance in the campus, there were experts from public administration, management, civil service and so on.

In order to run the non-teaching staff training smoothly, the campus had formed a training organizing committee that consisted of Dr. Min Pun as Coordinator, and Purna Gurung, Nawa Raj Bastola, Chandra Bahadur Khadka, Gyan Bahadur Gurung, Prakash Thapa and Nirajan Thapa as members.

The non-teaching training was organized for 45 clerk and section officer level non-teaching staff of Prithvi Narayan Campus.
